What Not To Do...

Last Sunday saw another unthinkable act of violence, this time against a group of worshippers at a small Baptist church in Texas. It is the latest in a series of senseless and tragic events that have caused church-goers everywhere to question the safety of attending worship as never before in our lifetime. While our thoughts and prayers go out for the victims of these horrible events, our minds are also focused inward as we consider our own circumstances and what we should do to prepare for the unimaginable. Across the country, church leaders are discussing security measures and emergency plans, doors are being locked, guards are being hired, and families are having difficult conversations about what to do in the case of a live shooter. These are discussions and actions that were never considered a generation ago but have become an unfortunate part of our new reality. While I believe that there are some important discussions that need to take place about what to do in the case of such an event, I also believe that there are some things that we need to be reminded not to do in the face of evil:

- **Do not lose faith**. While the motivation and goals of those who act violently toward innocent people may be varied and sometimes unknown, the goal of Satan in encouraging these works of evil is clear—to destroy faith, and ultimately the hope of salvation, in the lives of people. Do not allow Satan to win. Continue to trust in God with unwavering faith in any circumstance (Hebrews 11).
- **Do not abandon the church**. Some would suggest that the simplest way to avoid the danger is to stay away from church gatherings. However, our time together in worship must remain an essential part of our relationship with Christ and with one another (Hebrews 10:25).
- **Do not quit loving**. It can be very easy, in these situations, to exchange our love for hate and our compassion for malice, but we must remember the example and teaching of Jesus as we continue to love even those who are filled with hatred for us (Matthew 5:43-45).

May the God of heaven and earth watch over us, care for us, and bless us in every good way with His mighty hand, and may we continue to be a source of light in an ever-increasingly dark world.

I hope you have been as blessed this week by our Lord as I have been! It is truly a wonderful time to be alive and to be a part of God's family. With so many negative and dark things happening in the world, it is good to meditate on some wonderful things (Philippians 4:8). I am happy to say that we are about ½ to the initial goal of co-workers I wrote about last week.

I would like for us to consider a part of local evangelism that is crucial to long standing success, the concept of getting permission from folks we come in contact with. Permission for what you would ask? What we really are trying to get is permission to share information with them. It might be about a VBS, or a Fall Festival, or a Grief Seminar, or a Bible class. We might be having a special sermon series that you think would be of interest to a specific person based on what you know about the circumstances of that person's life. It is much easier to ultimately end up sitting across the table with an open Bible, if we have nurtured a relationship with them. This is not to say that door knocking does not work, it has worked and will work in many instances and places. What I am talking about is with folks we already have some type of relationship with.

There are only three reasons why people will turn down a request for a Bible study.

- First, if they do not have enough information to make an informed decision. They may know absolutely nothing about the church of Christ, or about how to deal with a crisis in their life. We show them we care when we make information available to them.
- Second, they do not see us as a reliable source. Consistently living our faith before people, and providing them with sound biblical advice over time will remove the perception that we are a questionable source of information.
- Third, they may not perceive a need to hear what we have to say. They figure things are going okay in their lives and so, why should they listen to us. Consistently sharing useful information with them over time will help them understand that there really are people who care.
