

How is your eyesight? Our eyes are very important parts of our body. It is important that we maintain the health of our eyes on both the physical and spiritual level.

On the physical side of things, we take certain steps to protect our eyes. To protect them from the Alabama sun we often will wear sunglasses to protect our eyes. If we are working in the woodshop or with heavy machinery, we don a pair of safety glasses or goggles.

The importance of protecting our eyes on the physical side of life is obvious. What about the spiritual? Do we take the same care in protecting our eyes from the spiritual dangers of this world?

If we are not careful, what we allow our eyes to become fixed upon can do great damage to our spiritual lives. Our eyes are very powerful

tools given to us by God, that we are to use according to His purpose. So, you might be wondering what are some things our eyes can do to help accomplish the will of God.

We can use our eyes to see those around us in need. Have we trained our eyes to see only what is on our busy daily agendas? There are people all around us that have needs which give us the opportunity to be the hands and feet of Jesus Christ. Obviously, the greatest need those around us have is to have a relationship with Jesus. Are we using our eyes to see those who have no relationship with the Savior or do we simply look the other way because it's easier? In addition to seeing the spiritual needs of others we ought to look to the physical needs of those around us as well. Christians, we are in the needs meeting business!

Consider what James says in James 2:15-16, "*If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace, be warmed and filled,' without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that?'*" Christians, are we willing to look outside of ourselves and our needs and to the needs of those around us? We live in a blessed nation and are a blessed people. Are we willing to use our eyes to see the opportunities around us to share those blessings with others?

The song that we sang as children remains true "Be careful little eyes what you see..." We have a Father up above, who is looking down in love and wants for us to use our eyes to see those around us who need the gospel and who need us to be the hands and feet of His Son while we are on earth.

All Things To All Men—To Save Some—*Nathan Adams*

My dad always told me to remember that "what hardens clay softens wax." This was a way of reminding me that every person is different and must be dealt with in a manner unique to them. So many failures in our society come from "cookie cutter" ways of doing things. The only problem is that using a singular way to do something with or for people will ultimately exclude people. In the world, the effects of such exclusion vary depending on what is being done. In the church, the effects of such exclusion can be spiritually destructive and eternal. We must always remember that the church has many different people, personalities, talents, and maturity levels.

Paul addressed this when he said to the Corinthians, "*I have become all things to all men, so that I may by all means save some*" (1 Corinthians 9:22). I encourage you to read the whole of that text in verses 19-23. In that text he speaks of how his approach is different with different

types of people. This difference was clearly seen in how Paul preached to the Jews in Acts 22 and how he preached to the Areopagite philosophers in Acts 17:22-31. The gospel message never changed, but certainly how it was presented changed with the audience. Paul considered where those he wanted to teach were and chose a path of teaching that would provide the best means for them to be saved.

In the church, we need to consider each person and their abilities. After such consideration, we need to find the best ways to incorporate those people and their talents into the work of the congregation. Too often we ask people to do what they do not have the talent or the training to accomplish. This causes discouragement and can lead to a person falling away from Christ. Paul made clear in his writings that we are different parts that do different things so that the body as whole works for the cause of Christ (Romans 12:4-8; 1 Corinthians 12:14-31). Being a strong

church will always require that we find ways for each member to bring their strengths to bear for the work of God and His kingdom.

In our efforts to reach out to the lost of this world, we must remember these same principles. There is no one "cookie cutter" way to approach the lost. If we use only one method, we will surely save a few, but we will neglect many others who could have been saved. Some people will never be interested in the gospel until they have a real relationship with the person who might lead them to Christ. There are people that at first, only want to just have general discussions about God and the Bible. Some want you to just have a conversation with them and others require a more direct approach. There are people that will decide in a day and those that will take years. It is eternally important that we consider the individual and then determine the best course to lead them to salvation.
