How Much Is It Worth?

"Everything is for sale at the right price." My dad was a salesman by trade and, in some ways, lived by this motto. He loved cars—especially classic cars. You never knew what old car he might drive home that he had bought that day. But he never owned a car that wasn't for sale (including the '63 split-window Corvette—you car guys will understand the magnitude of that). He never kept one very long because as soon as someone came along and offered him the right price for it, he would sell it.

As many of you know, I have an old truck—a 1964 Chevy C10 stepside that my dad bought for me when I was 15 years old. A friend keeps telling me that he wants to buy it from me so, today, I told him to come get it. When he asked what the price tag was, I told him \$20,000. Now that's at least ten times what it is worth, so he knew that I was just kidding with him because, as I've told him many times, it's not for sale. (Either my dad or I have bought and sold the thing 3 times, and Andrea says I'm not allowed to sell it again.) So, here's the point: that old truck, because of its history and sentimental value, is worth far more to me than it would be to anyone else. While many people would see it as a broken down piece of junk, I see it is as a treasure full of memories and potential. It's funny how we place value on things—value that has nothing to do with what those things are actually worth.

Do you have something that you would never sell? Something that is so precious and valuable to you that nothing can compare to its worth? What about your soul? On one occasion, Jesus asked the questions: "For what profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul? Or what would a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matthew 16:26) The fact of the matter is that many people are willing to sell their souls for all manner of worldly things and pleasures. They place so much value on things that are ultimately worthless that they are willing to give up the one thing they have that will remain throughout eternity. What about you? How much is your soul worth to you? Is there a price at which you would sell it? Have you already?
