## “First, Do No Harm”

*Primum non nocere.* This is the Latin phrase that is translated “first, do no harm.” This maxim is often understood to be part of the Hippocratic Oath, the ancient writing that is traditionally viewed as the foundation of medical ethics in the western world. Though this precise phrase is, in fact, not found in the Hippocratic Oath, the concept is, and it continues to be a guiding principle in the practice of medicine today.

Consider this phrase, not in the context of medicine, but in the context of our lives in Christ. We often speak of the responsibility that we have to be the light of the world (Matthew 5:14-16) and typically understand this to mean doing good, serving others, and providing a positive example of Christianity to the world around us. But, we must also remember that there is, in fact, another side to being the light of the world that can be summed up in the phrase, “do no harm.” You see, as we go out into the world, we do so as representatives of Christ and His church. We wear His name and carry His banner with us wherever we go – to work, into our neighborhoods, to the ballfield, and into restaurants and shopping centers. It is not only our purpose to propagate the church through our positive and Christ-like actions, but also to protect the church by avoiding behavior that could serve to turn people against Christ or His people. Rudeness, unkind words or actions, and hypocrisy are among the dangerous enemies of the Lord’s church that often show up in the lives of Christians and that threaten to do irreparable damage to the cause of Christ. Can there be any sadder testament to a Christian’s influence than for a person to say, “I will never go to that church because of [the name of a member]?” May those words never be spoken of us!

As we live in this world as Christians, may we always remember that the world is watching us and some of them are forming opinions and making decisions about Christ based on what they see in our lives. Let us always strive to let our lights shine, not only by doing good and being a positive example, but also by remembering to live in such a way that we do no harm.
