Add To Your Faith Virtue...

"But also for this very reason, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue, to virtue knowledge, to knowledge self-control, to self-control perseverance, to perseverance godliness, to godliness brotherly kindness, and to brotherly kindness love. For if these things are yours and abound, you will be neither barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ."

2 Peter 1:5-8

As our faith in God develops and grows, it should naturally lead us to grow in other areas of our spiritual lives as well. Faith becomes a natural stepping stone to virtue because of our desire to be closer to and more like our heavenly Father. The word "virtue" can be better translated as "moral excellence" and pertains to the character and integrity of our everyday lives. Peter had already referred to the moral excellence of God who has called us (1:3) and now challenges us to diligently strive to emulate that same moral excellence in our own lives. Decency, honesty, purity, sincerity – these are just some of the qualities that characterize moral excellence and that bring dependability and consistency of character to our lives and relationships. While our world continues to value these traits as admirable and desirable, it seems that they are displayed less and less in the lives of people today. But God has called His people to live by a higher and nobler standard! A life that is lived in devotion and service to God must be a life that exhibits integrity and character, that is to say, moral excellence. Our influence in the world depends on it. Our faithfulness and salvation require it.

So, how do we go about adding virtue to our faith? The process must surely begin with a decision. We must decide that we desire to be close to God and to be as much like Him as we can be while clothed with this human body. We must then determine to make God's standard our own, conforming our will to His and turning away from the unacceptable mentalities and attitudes of the world. As we do so, our lives take on the qualities of virtue that allow us to emulate God's moral excellence. May God help us to strive for moral excellence, adding virtue to our faith.

"You've got to stand for something or you'll fall for anything." This quote is attributed to the likes of Alexander Hamilton, Gordon A. Eadie, Irene Dunne and others. If folks would just open their Bible, they would see the idea is original to the Lord.

Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians wrote, "...so that we may no longer be children, tossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by craftiness in deceitful schemes" (Ephesians 4:14). In context, Paul is discussing the need for Christians to grow in the Lord and stand fast in the truth of His word. Paul, through inspiration, was addressing the danger of Christians being easily distracted and pulled away from the truth.

Satan has an almost unending supply of tools at his disposal with

which to trip us up. One of those tools is false teaching designed to soothe "itching ears." God knew Satan would try this. This is evidenced by Paul feeling the need to address the idea of standing fast in God's truths and not being "as children, tossed to and fro."

There are stadiums which are regularly filled with souls listening to a preacher who resembles little more than a motivational speaker. There are university classrooms in which professors are bent on destroying any amount of belief our Christian students might have. There are those in the government who, if they had it their way, would remove any historical record of our Christian heritage.

How is a Christian to respond to these challenges? When the world around us seems to be dead set against us, what are we to do?

Stand firm.

Christian, stand firm in the truth of God's word. There is great power in the word of God, "for the word of God is living and active. Sharper than any two-edged sword..." (Hebrews 4:12). The Bible is not an outdated book of "good advice" or "good stories," it is literally the word of God to the world.

Stand firm in the promises of God. God has made us many promises through His word. The world will try to prove them false, but it will never succeed. Satan will try to plant seeds of doubt as to whether or not God will keep His promises; do not allow them to grow in your heart. Stand firm.

Christian when the world seems against us, when Christianity seems to be becoming more and more unpopular, **stand firm**.

I Cannot Help Myself!—Nathan Adams

The apostle Paul had so much to be thankful for in his life. Jesus Christ had brought such a profound and monumental change to it. Before Jesus spoke to him, Paul was a violent and aggressive persecutor who hunted, imprisoned, forced Christians by threat to blaspheme their Lord, and, consented to the deaths of many. Yet, after the road to Damascus we see a man who gave that same ferocity to his love for all the lost and for the Lord's church. Yet, I do not believe a day went by that Paul was not amazed at the reality of Jesus' love for him. It truly was amazing grace that saved him.

Even late in his life, Paul seemed to get caught up in his awe regarding our Lord and Savior. Twice in 1 Timothy Paul seems to become distracted from his teaching by a need to give praise and honor to Jesus Christ. It is almost as if he could not help himself.

In 1 Timothy 1:15-17, Paul speaks of Jesus' purpose in coming to the world to save sinners. Then in a very personal way he uses himself as an example of the greatness of Jesus' saving power. It seems at that point, Paul is thinking about what Jesus did for him and suddenly breaks away from his point and says, "Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen." After this,

he returns to instructing young Timothy to fight the good fight of faith.

In chapter 6, Paul is speaking of our need to be faithful till the Lord returns. Again, at the mention of the Lord's return Paul suddenly breaks into praise by saying, "He who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords, who alone possesses immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no man has seen or can see. To Him be honor and eternal dominion! Amen." Immediately again, Paul returns to his instructions telling the rich to trust in God, not uncertain riches.

I love this thought of Paul just getting so wrapped up in his reverence, love, and dedication to Jesus that he just has these apparent outbursts of praise. For us today, too many people are unable to worship God unless the singing is beautiful and the sermon is charismatic. Yet, we see Paul praising Christ at the simple thought of what Jesus had done for him. I doubt the singing or the message affected the quality of his worship. May we be literally bursting with praise every time we think of our Lord and Savior! May we simply be unable to help ourselves.

Reading for September 11-17: 2 Thessalonians 1-3

Paul's second letter to the Thessalonians picks up where the first left off, by reminding the Thessalonians of the assurance of Christ's return and urging them to remain faithful to God in preparation for that great day. False teachers will rise up, persecution will come, and trials will test, but God's people will be victorious if they will remain faithful to Him and continue to endure. - What are some things that we can do to help us to remain focused on faithfulness and service as we wait on the Lord's return?
